BASIS FOR THE PROPOSED BUDGET

The 2003-04 Proposed Budget for the Proposition C Transit Improvement Fund relates to current year funding as follows:

Proposition C, the one half cent sales tax for transit improvements, was approved by the voters in November 1990. Local return receipts are anticipated to be approximately \$42 million annually, depending on economic conditions. Since 1993, Proposition C funds have been spent as follows: 5.4% for bus transit; 27.0% for Metro Rail; 6.4% for other rail; 23.7% for highways; 3.9% for Transportation Demand Management; 15.3% for Matching Funds and 17.8% for support.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

- ♦ The Budget uses the MTA's countywide growth rate to forecast sales tax revenue, which predicts an increase of over 2 percent from 2002-03 receipts.
- Matching Funds: The funding provided reflects the cash flow needs for projects underway that were funded in previous year MTA Calls for Projects, in the State Department of Transportation's Safe Routes to Schools Program and to provide the City's match for TEA-21 projects. \$40.3 million is provided for MTA Calls for Projects, and a portion is reserved for anticipated cost overruns on Call Projects. These projects will be identified in the 2002-03 Transportation Grant Fund Report and the City will have to bear the costs of any project cost overruns. The need for these funds will be addressed in the 2003-04 Transportation Grant Fund Report. It should be noted that another \$1,000,000 is provided in the Proposition A Budget for MTA Call for Projects. The total amount provided for MTA Call for Projects in 2003-04 is \$41.3 million.
