

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1.0 RECENT PROJECT DEVELOPMENTS & ACTIVITIES

1.1 Project Status

- The Paseo del Río Project and Water Quality Improvements Project are 99% through their Pre-Design Phase and are expected to move into formal Design in January 2024.
- The Taylor Yard G2 River Park Project has not yet begun its formal Pre-Design Phase.
- In December 2023, BOE and MRCA drafted an amendment to the existing MOU.

1.2 On-Site Activities

- In October and November 2023, a City-approved contractor performed asbestos abatement work on-site. This work was described in a South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) Procedure 5 Asbestos Abatement Plan, prepared by the Bureau of Engineering's Taylor Yard consultant, WSP, and approved by SCAQMD before work began. Throughout the abatement work, the contractor was monitored closely by General Service Department forces and WSP. Abatement work was funded by the US Environmental Protection Agency's 2019 and 2020 Brownfield Grants. A walkthrough to review completed work was held in December 2023.
- Regular maintenance is performed by General Services Division Construction Forces on a weekly basis.

1.3 Community Engagement

■ The formal California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) process began during this quarter. The project and environmental management team released the Notice of Preparation on October 12, 2023. Both teams met with the 100 Acre Partnership Community Advisory Committee on October 18, 2023. An in-person scoping meeting for the Paseo del Río Project was held on November 8, 2023, and was followed by a virtual meeting on November 15, 2023. The goal of the meetings was to solicit formal feedback on scope for the project's CEQA evaluation.



4.0 PROJECT BACKGROUND & GLOSSARY

4.1 Project Background

- The Taylor Yard G2 River Park Project is Project No. 165 of the City Council adopted Los Angeles River Revitalization Master Plan (C.F. 07-1342) and is described in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Los Angeles River Ecosystem Restoration (LARER) Integrated Feasibility Report. The report is also known as the ARBOR or "Area with Restoration Benefits and Opportunities for Revitalization" Study. As a key opportunity area, the G2 parcel is identified as a cornerstone site of the LARER Project. The G2 parcel is situated in Reach 6 of the LARER Project and is adjacent to the soft-bottomed portion of the Los Angeles River known as the Glendale Narrows.
- The development of the G2 parcel is intended to be implemented through a series of projects, as described below, subject to approval by the City Council and the Mayor:

- The Paseo del Río Project will develop approximately 8 acres of the G2 Parcel. The project will include walking paths, habitat restoration, soil remediation, educational signage, an entry plaza with parking and restrooms, and a kayak landing. This project was combined with the Water Quality Improvements Project due to their close physical proximity on site and similar schedules. NTP was issued to a consultant team in April 2022 for pre-design, design, environmental documentation and review, and design during construction services for both projects.
- The Water Quality Improvements Project is funded by Proposition O, includes close coordination with the City of LA Sanitation and Environment (LASAN), and will develop approximately 4 acres of the G2 Parcel. The project will include a water quality improvement feature, habitat restoration, soil remediation, and educational signage. This project was combined with the Paseo del Río Project due to their close physical proximity on site and similar schedules. NTP was issued to a consultant team in April 2022 for predesign, design, environmental documentation and review, and design during construction services for both projects.

■ The Taylor Yard G2 River Park Project will develop the remainder of the 42-acre G2 parcel. This project will transform the former Union Pacific Railroad Company (UPRR) rail yard into a vast habitat-focused open space along the Los Angeles River.
