Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications.

Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user.

What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TTY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service. 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Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the communications assistant is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service ..." when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

SEISMIC GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE (SGC) BRIDGE IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

June 16, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 9:31 a.m.

No General Public Comment.

Item 1 Approval of Minutes from the May 26, 2022 meeting.

Disposition: Approved

Item 2 Bureau of Engineering – Sixth Street Viaduct Replacement Project Proposed Staffing and Salary Appropriations for Fiscal Year 2022-23

Disposition: Approved

Shawyue Doong, Bureau of Engineering (BOE) from Sixth Street Viaduct Replacement Project requested approval of the approved staffing and salary appropriations for fiscal year 2022-23 in the amount of \$2.4 million broken down by the following funding sources: \$200,000 in the Municipal Improvement Corporation of Los Angeles (MICLA) and \$2.2 million in General Fund monies. There will be a reduction in staffing positions from nine to seven resolution authority positions, six in the Bureau of Engineering, and one in the Department of Public Works, Office of Accounting.

With construction set to complete in August 2022, program staffing may be reduced further as the project transitions into the closeout phase. However, the project will still require staffing and support for inspection, quality assurance, contract compliance verification, and specialty verification and street lighting resources.

Jennifer McDowell, Mayor, asked if there will be any overlap from the construction of the viaduct to the construction of the park underneath the bridge. Mr. Doong, BOE, answered that the two projects are separate as a different team will be involved in the construction of the park.

Matias Farfan, CLA, asked whether the funding recommendation get revised to specify the receiving departments and originating accounts. Leah Chu, CAO, clarified the staffing reimbursements will be funded through the Capital and Technology Improvement Expenditure Projects, General Fund account with the appropriate funding breakdown.

Item 3 Bureau of Engineering – Verbal Report on the Impact of the Federal Infrastructure Bill on Bridge Funding – Information Only

Disposition: None

Kevin Minne, BOE, reported the State will fund the actual cost to repair and maintain bridge, accounting for cost escalation and other unforeseen costs. The Bureau of Engineering is proposing an annual bridge maintenance program as part of its Strategic Plan, and plans to apply the appropriate criteria, such as equity, mobility and climate adaptation, to prioritize the program's work plan, with the intention of leveraging available grant funds.

Mr. Farfan, CLA, asked staff to clarify the anticipated completion date of the Strategic Plan. Mr. Minne, BOE, advised the Plan will be a public report anticipated for release at the end of the calendar year, once the prioritization exercise of the top 50 most deteriorated is complete. The grant writing phase will be extended past the calendar year to enable BOE to apply for planning grants to support this project.

Mr. Farfan, CLA, asked if there will be support for new bridges or pedestrian bike bridges. Mr. Minne, BOE, answered these bridges will be included along with a community engagement process, primarily with the Council Offices and Neighborhood Councils to identify new bridges.

Matt Szabo, CAO, asked whether the AB 2120 is ongoing or time limited funding. Mr. Minne, BOE, answered the intention of the Bill is to support the program through the life of the infrastructure bill, with the actual sunset of the program left to the discretion of the State. In prior years, the State has established a similar Bridge Rehabilitation Bill.

Mr. Szabo, CAO, asked BOE to clarify whether the cost increase is attributable to increases in material and labor costs. Mr. Minne, BOE, answered that the increase reflects the updated budget that was submitted to CalTrans to adjust for funding shortfall projections.
